




## The Historical Source



#### Some facts abot the manuscript:

- The I.33 is stored in the Royal Armouries in Leeds/UK.
- It is dated around 1300.
- Presumably written by a monk.
- His name might have been Liutger who might have been retired soldier/knight.
- As of today, there are 40 different plays. It is certain that some pages are missing.
- The last play introduces a women fighting with sword and buckler.
- The manuscript describes a closed system of sword & buckler fencing.

# Martial Principles



- Pure objective → « obtain a victory , instantaneously and absolute »
- Real objective, control → « having control over your opponent, by controlling the space in between and controlling one self »
- All techniques should be able to be produced by everyone; small, big, man, woman, etc.
- The power that will be generate by the body, amplified by the sword should give a maximum of force and effect.
- A certain technique...
  - should be performed to **perfection**, not to functionality.
  - should be as **simple** as possible.
  - should work according to the nature of the human body.
  - should become a **automatic** reaction, instinctive reactions are not allowed within an art.
- One should be aware at all times what I.33 is about. Playing with swords is lethal.

### Use of the Buckler

Closing the attack line

Protecting the Hands

Strike (Edge or Flat)

Gain/Take Control

### **Sword movement**

MS 3227a → the point goes like a string to the opponent!

Usage of Point of Rotation

No "Pirate Fencing" ← no big, exaggerated movements

"Stichschlag" ← thrust strikes

#### **Stances**

Bent forward - shoulders over knees

Always look "sexy" ☺




# First Play – Prima Custodia





Pommel is held relatively high!



Back of the foot visible: Indicates that the right foot is back! The foot is shown from the side: Confirms that the leading leg is the left!



# Halpschilt vs Prima Custod. 🦠




The fencer in Halpschilt (Half-Shield) approaches.

The fencer in the Guard falls under the Half-Shield. It can be observed that the hands of the fencer who falls under are mostly lower than the one adopting half-shield.












